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# 100TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION MONTEBELLO WATER TREATMENT PLANT

SAVE THE DATE 9/19/2015

*Baltimore residents came to Montebello to enjoy a day of celebration on September 13, 1915. Politicians, local residents and public health advocates recognized the accomplishments of scientists, city officials and engineers that masterminded the new modern Montebello Water Treatment Plant.*


A re-creation of that 1915 event for 100th anniversary of the Montebello Treatment plant #1 will be celebrated on September 19, 2015, but of course with many modern day twists added to the festivities. Most of the day's events will take place at Lake Montebello near the northwest gate building. There's lots of fun planned.

**1915 - Thousands came to the Montebello plant on September 13th.** They came to celebrate the healthy innovation, enjoy cups of fresh ice water and see the complex developed to provide clean water to Baltimore residents. Photos show that men wore

smart-looking straw 'boater' hats; women wore long skirts to the ankle and large sashes with bows in the back, fancy bonnets, and carried ruffled, parasols to block the sun. A time capsule was laid in the cornerstone. That time capsule will be opened and inspected. A new one for 2015 will be put in the structure.

## It was a very big day in 1915

The Montebello Water Filtration Plant I in Baltimore is notable in several ways. Locally, as Baltimore's first water filtration plant, it was a significant accomplishment towards improving living conditions, and it was a cornerstone of Baltimore's modern water supply. With clean, treated water, it pretty much eliminated cholera in the Baltimore area. At the time of its completion, The Montebello Filtration Plant was the second largest of its type in the nation and the most modern. In addition,



tion, its attractive architectural design and landscaping was an ideal of the national "City Beautiful" movement, giving it national distinction. (Excerpted from the Historical Society of Baltimore County website)

**2015 -- A Fun Day with Boats, Bikes, Food, Fun, History, Music and much more.**

The celebration on September 19th will highlight a fun mixture of live music, history, science and engineering, children's activities, family recreation, music, and picnicking and community education. The story of clean water and how it happened in Baltimore along with contemporary relationship we have to Lake Montebello, the recreation lanes and the infrastructure for our dependable running water is all on tap for the celebration. Baltimore's Department of Public Works is working with a planning committee including all community groups near Lake Montebello, including Mayfield, CHM and

HARBEL, all city departments connected to Lake Montebello, Morgan State University, the Public Works Museum and the American Water Association, Baltimore City and Baltimore County Historical societies, The Fire Museum and the Gathering, the food truck rally and concert promotion organization. Fun for kids, bicycles for riding along the lake and for the first time ever – Kayaks and canoes for paddling on Lake Montebello. A very limited number of visitors will be able to sign up for a tour the treatment plant. Sept 19th at Lake Montebello will be the place to be!

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## FOMOPL – A new medicine?

No, FOMOPL stands for Friends of Maryland Olmsted Parks and Landscapes. They are sponsoring a tour of Clifton Park and Mothers' Garden, will be led by Eric Holcomb, Baltimore Commission on Historical and Architectural Preservation and author of THE book on History of Northeast Baltimore, as well as Jim Bartlett, President of Friends of Mothers' Garden. Join the tour. May 16, tickets \$15. Meet at Mothers' Garden at 9:45 am - 12:00 pm.

FOMOPL is also looking to preserve a design feature of Baltimore through city legislation, specifically Baltimore City Council Bill 14-0453 to designate the Olmsted Parkways—The Alameda, 33rd Street, and Gwynns Falls Parkway—as City Landmarks. For more than 100

years, these greenways connect the parks of Baltimore city, conceived by the Olmsted Brothers Landscape Architecture firm, have graced our urban landscape. Olmsted Brothers is the successor firm of the famed architect Frederick Law Olmsted, who designed New York's Central Park. 33rd Street, Alameda, and Norman Avenue were either specifically designed or inspired by the Olmsted firm's vision for Baltimore's park connections by ribbons of green and trees to beautify the city. Council members Mary Pat Clarke and Nick Mosby have introduced an ordinance to declare these greenways – City Landmarks.

■ Did you know that there used to be a golf putting green in Herring Run Park on the Mayfield side of the Herring Run?


## Recollections from life-long Mayfield resident, Jack Frech.

"About 65 years ago there were spots where either a golf green or a tee once was active. I remember two. One was at Norman and Chesterfield, where the soft ball diamond was until recently. The other was more in the middle of the park. I think this one disappeared when the big eight foot diameter water tunnel was laid underground from near the Lake Montebello pump house to under the park, under the hill on the Crossland side to 'where' I don't know. That big pipe was put in about 60 some years ago. Construction took a huge chunk of trees off of the hill. Trees eventually filled the void. During construction several 'bad boy' friends and I ran through the pipe from near the pump house to who-knows-where. . . .? It was a long, fun run." - John Frech

*Note the water tunnel runs all the way to the Susquebanna River as a back-up source of water for the Baltimore Water system.*

■ **Hall Springs** – Harford Road Bridge construction work will leave Hall Springs not accessible for duration of construction. A meeting at Ray of Hope Church with Baltimore City Recreation and Parks planners had a variety of opinions at odds with the plan that had been approved by Planning Department. Representatives of some communities and Friends of Herring Run Park were not in favor of re-positioning the entry to *Hall Springs* picnic/playground area from Harford Road before the bridge work was started. With that leeway, BCRP's planner will revise the timetable for work at Hall Springs, but this will mean Hall Springs is not accessible to picnickers and playground goers for approximately 30 months once Bridge work commences. ■ **The Windmills at 32nd Street** Just in case you were wondering the windmills at 32nd and Harford Road are not missing in action. They will be back soon and most will be fitted with a wind generator to make the windmills power a light. This 'gateway park' will be landscaped with native plants and managed by Civic Works, thanks to a grant received from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to support the project.

(Tuesday) **Farmers Market** at 4500 Harford Road. # Q&A

## Laura Cohen Inspires Mayfield Mosaic Project

Laura is a Mayfield resident who lives on Lake Montebello Terrace. She conceived of and received funding for the Mosaic Stepping Stone project. Community members were able to set tiles at Mayfield's Fall Fest 2013 and our Summer Block Party 2014.

Q. *What inspired you to initiate the Mosaic Stepping Stone project?*

A. I have been a community artist, organizer and educator in Baltimore for the past eight years and love using art as a vehicle for community building, self-expression and social change. As the Community Arts Director at Baltimore Clayworks, a ceramics-based non-profit in Baltimore, I have helped to bring high quality ceramics programming and projects to communities all over Baltimore city and county for over seven years. It was my pleasure and privilege to bring the work that I do to my own community. Mayfield, Lake Montebello and Northeast Baltimore is a vibrant, welcoming, active and creative community. In living on Lake Montebello Terrace, I see dozens upon dozens of people walk by my porch every day, walking from Harford Road to the lake loop. The area where the sidewalk ends to the street's edge is more often than not, muddy and sometimes tricky to walk on. Mosaic stepping stones were a great solution to making the path more stable, beautiful and to engage community.

Through Baltimore Clayworks we received a grant from PNC to create and install the stepping stones. I am thrilled to finally get them in the ground so folks can see them every day on their way to the lake (and those that worked on them can see the fruit of their labor and creativity).

Q. *Have you done something like this before?*

A. Over the past years through my work with Baltimore Clayworks and other entities, I have collaborated on, facilitated and led numerous public community arts projects, from stepping stones and mosaic murals to painted murals and community engagement projects.

Q. *Where are some of the public art projects around Baltimore?*

A. This summer, we'll be installing a 36'x3' mosaic mural in west Baltimore in Sandtown/Winchester/Upton on the corner of Pennsylvania and Presstman on the Harris-Marcus Center as well as a mosaic installation on the fountain on the opposite corner in collaboration with Jubilee Arts Center, a community arts center

offering arts to community [www.jubileeartsbaltimore.org](http://www.jubileeartsbaltimore.org) When all is said and done, over 200 people will have had their hands in these mosaic murals. Very exciting!

Q. *What is your academic and art background?*

A. I have my BS in Art Education from the University of Vermont and my MA in Community Arts from the Maryland Institute College of Art. I am an idea oriented artist and maker, working mostly in ceramics and love using art making as a vehicle for connection, overcoming intolerance, social change, community building and relationship development.

Q. *Have you always wanted to work as and with artists?*

A. I believe everyone has the capacity to make, get their hands dirty, be brave and try new things. I love the term maker rather than artist as I believe we all have capacity to make and create. Although I love creating, exploring, reflecting and connecting through art, my primary passion is relationship building, connection and striving for social change- art making is an amazing liaison for this. No matter who you are, your background, age, gender, race, etc- all of the things



that define and also can divide us, clay (and other arts) respond the same- we touch it, it moves. It's grounding, humbling and human.

Q. *Is there something about clay and tile that particularly attracted your interest?*

A. Absolutely. As I mentioned prior, clay is humbling, grounding and human. As a material from the earth with deep roots on human history throughout the world in so many different cultures, it connects us to our past, present and future. What we create and fire can and will outlive us. It captures and time and experience that we can reflect on our entire lives.

Clay is also a forgiving and tangible material which not only encourages us to be present but also keeps us accountable. We touch it, it moves. We let it dry too quickly and it cracks, we can add water, mix it up again and start over. I feel working with clay parallels working with people.

*Q&A With Lauren Cohen, Mayfield Mosaic Project, continued*

Q. *You were able to take a sabbatical last year. What was your purpose/focus of study and has it changed any of your thoughts on community art education and engagement?*

A. I had the privilege of taking 2.5 months last fall to explore ten cities and area of the country, researching how communities, organizations and people use the arts as a vehicle for social change in their communities. The experience reinforced and reenergized my practice and inspired me to take risks, try new things and rebuild a personal studio practice. I have an exhibition of my personal ceramic work in the Community Arts Gallery at Baltimore Clayworks opening May 15 from 6-8PM <http://baltimoreclayworks.org/exhibition/future.html#> and I kept and keep a blog of my findings and work, elsewhere and in Baltimore: <http://creativitycraftcommunitychange.tumblr.com/> I have a gallery talk of my sabbatical and personal work of my exhibition, Creativity, Craft, Community & Change on Tuesday, June 9 from 7-9PM at Baltimore Clayworks in Mt. Washington.

Q. *I understand you have another past-time. You brew your own home-made beer. How did you get into that?*

A. I have been brewing beer for over five years – I run a women’s home brewing club called Lady Brew Baltimore, where women get together every other month a different members’ houses and design recipes, brew beer, create labels and connect. For me, it’s

another form of community arts and has cultivated a great group of women in Baltimore who love to make, connect and support a vibrant community. I started brewing beer after I finished graduate school years back – I felt the need to discover a new craft. [www.ladybrewbaltimore.com](http://www.ladybrewbaltimore.com)

Q. *What would you recommend to someone considering such a hobby?*

A. Give it a shot! Try it out and be brave – there are so many resources in the city for home brewing (especially over the last couple of years). Nepenthe Homebrew is a homebrew shop in Woodberry and they’re accessible, welcoming and know a lot about beer. I am also happy to split a pint and talk about brewing any time.

## Youth Scholar – Community Vision Prize

Open to Middle School and High School Mayfield students:

Get your creative thoughts flowing! Answer the question “If I were the Mayor of Mayfield, I would. . . .” as an essay or poem of 500 words or less, or as an artistic representation – video, spoken word, photo essay or power-point or drawing/painting of some kind that addresses the theme question. Up to 2 awards of \$250 each may be made. Judges may also recommend additional funding for a project so that it can be implemented by the student. Please note, the content of the submission is not about what the student has done in past academic or past volunteer efforts, but instead a forward-thinking community improvement that the student believes would make Mayfield an even better place to live. Judges are looking for the authentic



voice of the student and the student’s assessment of what the he or she sees as a ‘better’ way to involve community in a project. It could be about undertaking a beautification effort, improving physical condition of the community, increasing neighbor to neighbor cooperation toward some goal or service, adding a feature to the neighborhood events, or something else the student sees as an ‘opportunity’ for Mayfield.
