



1 Butterfly habitat + x Number of attractive plants = SFA Outdoor Classroom in Mayfield

Saint Francis of Assisi School builds an outdoor classroom. The monarch butterflies have a haven in Mayfield and will be studied by SFA students up-close and personal. The St Francis of Assisi School has installed and now has growing a butterfly habitat garden. Between the church and rectory buildings a stand of common milkweed has built up - milkweed is the host plant of the Monarch butterfly and also a nectar plant for other butterflies, bees and hummingbirds. Other plants, particularly those native to the Chesapeake region, are being added to create a supportive habitat for butterflies and other creatures. This garden will be a resource for SFA students to learn about the Monarch butterfly and its yearly migration to Mexico, raise caterpillars in the classroom and engage in other garden-related activities. A generous grant from the Baltimore Rotary Club to St. Francis of Assisi School provided some of the project funds.

Stroll by the garden and see our new outdoor classroom. Say hi to the butterflies.

THE HARFORD ROAD PEDESTRIAN UNDERPASS

The Greenway and Herring Run Master Plan Moves Forward

'Harford Road Bridge Bicvcle/Pedestrian Underpass' It's now officially named. The Friends of Herring Run Advisory group voted it's inclusion in Harford Road Bridge project (slated for completion in 2012) after each member reported a majority of support from their respective neighborhoods. As Mayfield's representative to the Advisory Group, I reported there were a majority of responses in favor of the underpass with 12 for and 6 against. I also expressed the concerns of those Mayfield residents who regarded the underpass as a possible haven for graffiti artists, those needing to relieve themselves and/or an opportunity for criminal behavior. Mary Porter of Baltimore City Parks & Recreation assured the Advisory Group that there

were design solutions to these issues. She promised that these design features would be brought before the advisory committee in the future, when they would be properly considered in the design process. She gave some examples for how these concerns can be thwarted through design -- a hose hook up could be installed for keeping the area clean, and a substance like wax can be applied to treat walls allowing for easy graffiti removal.

Some of the reasons given by committee members for their support of the Bicycle/Pedestrian Underpass were:

• Underpass is safer for pedestrians than crossing Harford Road now or in the future.

• It is safer than the current passage from Halls Springs to F. Hooper Field.

• It will make the Herring Run trails safer by bringing more people and thus eyes on

the trails.

• It will provide a parking alternative to Chesterfield for those using Father Hooper Field.

The Green Way Trail, which will be American with Disabilities Act compliant, has been funded and was approved by the Herring Run Advisory Committee unanimously.

The overall Herring Run Master Plan was approved conditionally. The advisory group will identify those parts of the plan, which due to the differences of opinion, would receive a general description in the plan. This will allow for future community review and study before being more specifically defined.
