Mayfield sincerely congratulates resident Phil Jackson on his appointment by

Governor Martin O'Malley to serve as trial court judge in the Circuit Court of Baltimore City on Dec 2012. His investiture was in April attended by family, friends, neighbors and colleagues.

From the Governor's Press release, his long public service to the justice system was presented. Philip S. Jackson has served for the past 19 years as an assistant United States attorney for the District of Maryland. At various times, he served as deputy chief of the Narcotics Division, the attorney coordinator for the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force, and the international matters coordinator. Prior to joining the U.S. Attorney's Office, Mr. Jackson spent seven years as an assistant state's attorney for Baltimore County. He graduated from the University of Baltimore School of Law in 1984 and from the University

of Maryland at College Park in 1979. In addition to his legal credentials Phil is active in the community and parish. He was to have been the co- Trivia Quiz master at the St. Francis of Assisi Trivia Night on April 26th. He is a volunteer and mentor, Christopher's Place/Our Daily Bread, 2009-. Member, St. Francis of Assisi Parish, and has served in many roles for the parish including eucharistic minister; former president, home-school association; former member, parish council. Phil is also in the *Hemapheris/Marrow Donor Program* at The Johns Hopkins University. Phil and Diane will see their son Ryan wed another Mayfield resident Rachel Myers this spring. Diane, has been a stalwart volunteer in the neighborhood too. She has served as the parish community health nurse and for many years has organized the health fair and free health screenings. A Fond Farewell and a Wish for Mayfield

After more than 50 years in Mayfield Lucie and Ed Paulus are leaving to live in Oakcrest in early May. Editor met with them for a few hours recently and asked them to reflect on their life in Mayfield. Lucie had been the crossing guard for St. Francis of Assisi for 23 years. She retired in 1992. Ed worked as a chemist at ARMCO Steel (now AK Steel) and then as a chemist for the State of Maryland. He retired in 1993. Here's what Ed and Lucie told Mayfield News:

When did you move to Mayfield?

"We moved into this home on July 5 1959 and in December that same year we had our only daughter. We knew we needed a larger home for our family of 6. We raised three sons and a daughter. We lived on

Dudley at Sinclair Lane before we moved to Mayfield. We always dreamed of moving to Mayfield. We used to walk around the beautiful streets here."

Lucie mentioned how she worked hard to get the house ready for the arrival of their daughter — fixing up the 1928 home that hadn't had much done to it, before it was to be their home in Mayfield.

How did you meet?

"Lucie is from Germany," Ed said proudly. "I was stationed in Rhineland at Nahe. I was part of an advance team to get the barracks ready to be the HQ of the 2nd Armor Division and was a medical assistant. Ed explained how he would walk around town, because he wanted to meet the local people. "I loved to play table tennis. A buddy and I would play at the club house in town. But one day the club house was the site of a meeting, so we couldn't use the table tennis there. But my buddy said, "But I know a girl who has one..." That girl was Lucie." Ed found out later that Lucie was a well known local table tennis player, and was ranked 7th best in Germany. Ed & Lucie became friends. She was the baker's daughter and worked the counter at the bakery. She had studied English and Ed, being of German heritage, had studied German in school. They married in November 1952, when Ed was discharged from the service. And of course, all four of their children became pretty good at table tennis and many Mayfield kids spent hours in their basement playing and perfecting their game.

What will you miss about Mayfield?

Lucie took the lead on this question: "We will miss so many wonderful neighbors. We were lucky enough to have so many willing to help us. All of those nearby us have been very attentive, friendly and helpful." She recounted several specific instances of kindness from the Glasgows, Lemonds, Andersons and Savige/Shrum families.

Some may remember her article in Mayfield News a few years ago thanking the Cavellos, who live at Kentucky and Harford Road that came to help them when they had a car accident on Harford and then checked on them and shoveled their alley and walks during a big snow of 2010.

What are your best memories of living in Mayfield?

Ed told about Lucie's Sewing Club. They would have crabfeasts in the basement. Their neighbor Peter Cardegna was a wholesale fish seller and would get them the best crabs. Lucie told stories of many visitors. They enjoyed giving a room to visitors from Iceland, France, Australia, Germany and Italy. The Italian visitors were at "Good Sam"

Hospital for surgery training. They would return to be chief surgeon and deputy chief surgeon at Bari, Italy (on the Adriatic Sea). The doctors would call her "Mama Lucia!"

Ed & Lucie shared their favorite things. They love the beauty of Mayfield's gardens, the carillon bells on Sunday a.m. and sometimes Saturday. And of course, the block parties! They want to come back for the 50th

block party in 2014. She knows many of the families having been a crossing guard at SFA, but many don't recognize her now.

Ed shared an old document of the formation of Mayfield Improvement Association they received when they bought their home in 1959. That document stated their plans to have 100% of the community as members and dues were \$2.00 a year. Some of the "rules" they remembered were "No lawn mowers on Sunday, no wash hung on the line outside in Mayfield and no fences between houses."

What is your wish for Mayfield?

Ed knows that it is time for them to be in a different setting for their own health needs. Lucie is not at all happy about leaving the neighborhood. Lucie offered this message for all of us living here: "My hardest regret is to leave Mayfield. My wish for Mayfield is that it remain as nice as it was when we moved in 50+ years ago. May Mayfield bloom and prosper forever. "And she added, "I thank my guardian angel for helping us find Mayfield." She now leaves with a very heavy heart.

Mayfield wishes them the very best in their new home at Oakcrest, where a few other former Mayfielders are living and one neighbor works there. Their cherished Kentucky Avenue home is currently on the market and listed by Long and Foster. You can feel the love between them and of Mayfield when you're sitting with them.

Coming Soon to Your Water Bill: Cleaner Storm Water

From Blue Water Baltimore



Starting this summer, Baltimore City and the nine largest counties in the state must begin assessing fees on property owners based on the amount of storm water pollution each property produces.

Because storm water from urban & suburban areas

is the fastest growing source of pollution entering local streams, the Harbor, and the Chesapeake Bay this problem is directly impacting the health of Baltimore's people. Storm water pollution contributes to sewage overflows, compromises drinking water infrastructure, and creates flooding and so these mandate fees are an important part of the solution.

Baltimore City residents voted in November to create a new Storm

water Utility to manage these fees. In the past, resources for reducing storm water pollution came from the City's general fund, so these projects were often underfunded due to scarce resources and the need to provide other services. Once the utility is implemented, the funds collected will be dedicated to infrastructure improvements, consistent street sweeping operations and maintenance of existing structures. We will also see public/private partnership efforts to reduce litter, and a local source of funding for greening projects such as tree plantings and stream clean-ups. http://www.cleanwaterbaltimore.org/flyers/ Stormwater should get you to the fact sheet.

Mayfield Nature. Want butterflies in your garden?



Not all plants and flowers are created equal. Some attract specific butterfly species. Below is a list of plants that will attract particular butterflies. Blue Water Baltimore offers course on building gardens that attract birds, butterflies and bees.

Plant these Native Larval Host Plants near your Home

Over 100 species of butterflies are found in Maryland, this is a list of a few butterflies and examples of their native larval host plants. Some butterflies have several larval host plants

American Lady — Pussytoes (Antennaria plantaginifolia)

American Snout – Hackberry (Celtis occidentalis)

Black Swallowtail – Black snakeroot (Sanicula canadensis)

Gray Hairstreak – White Oak (Quercus alba)

Great Spangled & Variegated Fritillaries — Violets (Viola spp.)

Hackberry Emperor – Hackberry (Celtis occidentalis)

Monarch — Milkweeds (Asclepias incarnata, A. tuberosa)

Mourning Cloak – Black willow (Salix nigra)

Northern Pearly-Eye — Wild oats (Chasmanthium latifolium)

Pearl Crescent – White wood aster (Aster divaricatus)

Questionmark – American Elm (Ulmus americana)

Red Admiral – Wood nettle (Laportea canadensis)

False nettle (Boehmeria cylindrica)

Red Spotted Purple – Wild cherry (Prunus serotina)

Silver Spotted Skipper-Black Locust (Robinia pseudoacacia)

Spicebush Swallowtail – Spicebush (Lindera benzoin)

Sassafras (Sassafras albidum)

Tiger Swallowtail – Tuliptree (Liriodendron tulipifera)

Viceroy – Black willow (Salix nigra)

Zebra Swallowtail – Paw paw (Asimina triloba)
