PRESIDENT'S LETTER

How can it be February already when it feels like we were just celebrating Christmas? Our various community events were a big part of our holiday good times. Mayfield hosted Christmas caroling and hot cocoa with neighbors; and a week later, our very own "St. Nick" riding in on the back of a pickup truck, brought delight to our littlest residents. Each child sitting on Santa's lap was cuter than the last and enjoyed lots of delicious treats that neighborhood bakers always provide. Our other community activities involved St. Francis of Assisi parish and their long tradition of providing Christmas baskets to NE neighbors in need. Many Mayfielders assist each year in bringing gifts and food to almost 100 families. Lastly, my personal favorite event of the season — the spectacular Boychoir performance — Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols. It brings a Christmas spirit and joy that touches the soul with breathtaking music. How lucky we are to have all these holiday events right here in our neighborhood! Add in the beautifully decorated houses and Christmas in Mayfield seems just perfect.

Or, it was, right up until the text messages started coming in. "Did you hear? The family on Pelham had a break in... during the night.... while they were home." OMG! – I, like so many others, was horrified to hear that this family, living right around the corner from us, experienced this terrible event. Add that to the carjacking and attempted carjacking from earlier in the month and in an instant, holiday good time feelings, now gone. Now all I'm feeling is concern for the victims, frustration and seething anger at the brazen perpetrators, all the while trying to figure out how to communicate this incident to the community. Our Mayfield Update and Facebook communications guru/ Mayfield Board member volunteer was out of town, but reported the incident as soon as she found out. My social media skills are sorely lacking, and I was juggling a full schedule of activities for our holiday house guests. My focus shifted to making phone calls trying to find out exactly what happened so we

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have the facts straight, knowing my phone will start ringing off the hook, emails to the Northeast Police Major asking for increased patrols, and wanting to let our community know to be "on guard".

There is no roadmap for how to make this better, how to make it right. What's the answer, what next? We evaluate our communication strategies and fine tune our timing. We listen to advice from residents and answer questions with what we know. We check in with the family on Pelham and are grateful beyond measure that they are okay. We are even more grateful that they post on social media that, 'No, they are not leaving Mayfield, not leaving Baltimore, they just want their stuff back.' And we continue to roll up our sleeves, get back to communicating with our police officers and elected officials, remind folks about the NECOP opportunity and do our best to develop new crime prevention and safety strategies. Mayfield has asked to again host a "Coffee with a Cop" in the near future. We're waiting on confirmation from the NE Police District for a specific date.

But I know this for a fact: The good will and collective concern for our neighbors in Mayfield will always, always outweigh the bad actions of others.

Next 3rd District Town Hall Meeting — Thursday, April, 11, 2019 — Location to be announced





"Spotlight"

JACKIE MILAD

Jackie Milad, is a visual artist, 2018 Sondheim Semi-Finalist, and first recipient of the 3rd District Artist/District Grant Award. She and her family live in Mayfield.

Jackie Milad's work has been focused on symbolism and hidden language that pulls from cultural sources from around the world. Jackie's creative vision is a continuous narrative that combines her own cultural heritage with an irreverence towards her materials and process. No piece of art in Jackie's studio is safe and elements of her work are frequently cut, collaged, and recycled into new stories and compositions. She will use anything within reach and considers herself a "visual omnivore" with all manner of paper, ink, paint, and graphite featuring prominently in her work. The iconography she uses; repeated, jumbled, reorganized, and repurposed, draws on her Egyptian and Honduran heritage to construct a language wholly her own in which old symbols have new life and meaning. Despite the historical and cultural significance of the symbols she uses, Jackie resists the urge to treat them preciously and instead calls attention to how we as a society decide what is worth saving and what isn't. At

her core is a question every artist asks, "Why can't I just make my own rules?"

Jackie Milad resides in the Mayfield neighborhood with her family on Lake Avenue. She describes the community as a hidden gem, a quiet place full of green trees that shares a connection with nature as well allowing access to the city. Even though she frequently exhibits her work across the coun-

try and beyond, Jackie still has to hold a full-time job outside of her studio hours. This confines her time in the studio to weekends and days off. Jackie describes it best herself, stating that "as a Baltimore artist, [she] can't just exist as an artist". The impact of the Artist/District grant, \$3,000 over 3

months, will cover a multitude of costs every artist faces but few outside the medium understand. Jackie intends to use portions of the grant to document her work and ready it for exhibition, an expense every artist needs to account for in order to display and market their work.


Jackie will also use a portion of the grant to cover the costs of childcare and babysitting, allowing her to spend more time in the studio preparing for a busy fall schedule in which she'll be exhibiting work at School 33 Arts Center here in Baltimore. Jackie is currently working alongside the Artist/District program to identify ways to display her work and speak about the impact of the grant. She will be joined by the other Artist/District lottery winners who will each present to the community and demonstrate the vibrancy of our arts community here in the 3rd District and throughout Baltimore.

Two sets of Mayfield Twins at Green School of Baltimore hoping to compete at National Chess Tourney in May

Meet Asha and Asish Chhetri and Addison and Avery Fiore-Nelson. Mayfield twins times two. These twins share a passion and skill in common. They have been soaring in Baltimore's elementary school age chess scene over the past few years, placing in multiple tournaments both individually and as part of the Green School of Baltimore Chess Team. And now, the double duos are hoping to see their hard work pay off at the US Chess Federations National Elementary Chess Tournament, May 10-12, in Nashville.



The Green School of Baltimore is K-5 public charter school tucked nearly out of sight just behind Shrine of the Little Flower in neighboring Belair Edison. The school has built its curriculum and mission around learning with an environmental focus. In recent years an increasing number of children from Mayfield have enrolled at GSB. The Chess Team started at GSB in 2011. Rick Brummer, whose daughter Fiona was a second grader at GSB, is an avid chess player. He decided he could be more involved with the school by starting a Chess Club for the students. Rick coaches every Friday and is involved in monthly Saturday tournaments. His daughter graduated from GSB several years ago

The GSB chess club has grown to 35 students and has a waiting list. Coach Rick said, "Every year the strength of the club has built on itself. This is finally the year where we have enough highly skilled players who are putting in the hard work it takes to be real contenders at a nation level tournament." 2019 may be Green School of Baltimore's time to shine, and it may well be Mayfield kids who help them do it. These two sets of twins are now serious chess competitors among GSB's top division players and working hard toward success at the May tournament.

They are 5th graders, Asish and Asha Chhetri, and 4th graders Addison and Avery Fiore-Nelson. Asish and Asha, the children of Sthefane Melo and Purna Chhetri (Kentucky Avenue), have played chess at GSB for the past six and three years respectively. Asish began playing in kindergarten and is currently the club's highest ranked player based on ratings by the US Chess Federation. When not busy with chess, Asish is an avid soccer player and fan. Asha joined the chess club in third-grade and placed 3rd in last year's Maryland All Girls Tournament. The only thing she might enjoy as much as chess is her very strong role on GSB's Debate Team, where she has won numerous awards.

Addison "Addie" and Avery, the children of April Nelson and Margaret Fiore (Pelham Ave) began learning chess at age 4. Addison has played on the GSB chess team since kindergarten. In November 2017 as a 2nd grader, Addie had emerged undefeated and taking 1st Place in the Maryland State Chess Tournament. Avery, a homeschool student, was invited to join the GSB chess team as an affiliated player after taking a 1st place individual win in the Charles H. Percy Memorial tournament in November 2018. When not playing chess, both Avery and Addie enjoy playing soccer and tennis.

The two sets of twins, as well as the small handful of other national hopefuls from the GSB club put in countless additional hours each week honing their chess skills, including practices with skilled adult players (including a few Chess Masters) from the Charm City Chess Club.

Mayfield News has learned that the travel expenses to the National Tournament in Nashville will not be small- up to \$8000. The team is planning fundraising events for sup-

port to get the 6-8 student team and coaches from the Green School to this national tournament. If you are interested in helping the next chess champs get to the prestigious tournament, here are some ways you can help:

- 1) A check made out to EEE (Experiential Environmental Education), with a note designating "CHESS CLUB" can be mailed to GSB, 2851 Kentucky Avenue, Baltimore, MD 21213.
- 2) Watch out for fun events that will help the team to raise

funds, including a Skate and Gaming Night (3/8), Monster Golf and Laser tag discount tickets for sale, and possibly a restaurant night in Hamilton.

We applaud the twins Asish & Asha and Addison & Avery and the other students on the team aspiring to be chess champs at the National Elementary Chess Tournament in Nashville. We wish these young people much success demonstrating their strategic skill to the World of Chess and bringing a big trophy to the Green School of Baltimore in 2019.

Charlie Grace! She has an award-winning DREAM.

If you were listening to WYPR's Mid-day show on January 21st, MLK Day, Tom Hall introduced listeners to a young student from Commodore John Rodgers Middle School in Baltimore. That student is fifth grader, Charlie Grace Martin. She is 10 years old and she is the winner of the 2nd annual Dream Big Essay Contest. But did you know she is also our neighbor in Mayfield?! Charlie lives on Kentucky Avenue with her parents Kate and Mark and her siblings. She and her brother are Mayfield News delivery volunteers and have helped with set up for the Annual Summer Block Party.

The interview with Charlie was both fun and charming. (You can hear the interview via the link to the podcast portion of the January 21st broadcast. It is at the end of this article). Charlie talks about her school and how she loves to read and write and looking forward to high school, "because of the extracurricular activities that will be available." She's involved in debate and the National Academic League which competes with other City schools. She specializes in U. S.

States and state capitals. And she's glad she goes to the school where her dad is the principal saying it allows her to spend more time with him.

Inspired by Dr. King's famous "I Have a Dream" speech that he delivered on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial on August 28, 1963, Baltimore City School students from grades 5-12 are challenged to write a 300 word essay. Students were asked to write about what their dreams were for themselves, their families and their communities. Charlie won the contest, which is sponsored by the Modell Lyric. Her essay was about her Big Dream of being a writer of young adult literature. She likes mysteries, good stories and dystopian fiction. She admires J.K. Rowling for the Harry Potter series and like Rowling, wants to write for young readers with interesting content. Her essay was read on the air. It was very well written and her delivery was very grown up!

The awards ceremony was January 21st at the Modell Lyric in Baltimore.

Charlie told Mayfield News that Dr. King inspired her to dream because he spoke about a world where everyone is equal. He paved the way for Charlie, an Asian, to know she can dream and that her voice matters and might even inspire others. Charlie also revealed to us that she wrote the draft of her essay in one night, but it took about 3 weeks to revise, edit and submit!

Finally, she shared that being on the radio wasn't like what she imagined. She thought it would be like being on the news broadcast, but instead, she said, "you're just in a room with 2 microphones." She enjoyed the experience at WYPR, because people at the station were so nice to her and she liked the questions that were asked.

Historic Homeowner Tax Credit Program Workshop April TBD — 2201 Mayfield Ave Room for 25 participants;

The Homeowners Historic Tax Credit program is designed to assist homeowners living in older homes in designated historic areas, such as Mayfield, maintain their home. This tax credit reimburses 20% of approved expenses for repairs needed to keep the home in good shape (roofs, floors), repair or replace essential mechanical functions (furnace, air conditioning) and maintain the original features of the home (windows, doors, exterior). This workshop will walk you through the application form in detail and offer tips for making the process of documentation and budgeting as easy as possible.
